WITH THE ENTRY OF THE NEW SHERIFFS INSECURITY IN NIGERIA MUST ABATE

Efforts by the Nigerian Security Agencies have focused on degrading Boko Haram's capabilities, leading to a reduction in their ability to conduct sustained operations. The military has also been successful in liberating previously occupied areas in the North East, allowing internally displaced persons to return home. However, challenges remain, particularly in intelligence gathering and addressing the presence of Boko Haram spies within communities. The Nigerian Army along with allied forces has significantly weakened Boko Haram reducing their capacity to carry out large scale attacks. Areas previously under Boko Haram control in the North East have been reclaimed enabling the return of displaced populations. Internally displaced persons are voluntarily returning to their home in the liberated areas indicating a degree of restored stability. Despite successes the military faces challenges related to intelligence gathering particularly regarding Boko Haram's network of informants within communities. The military continues to grapple with longstanding issues related to insurgency, including the need to protect civilian right while also addressing the threat posed by Boko Haram's spies. But recently there appears to be a new surge in the activities of bandits, insurgency and kidnappers as recently witnessed early September 2025 in Borno, Katsina and Edo States in which more than 131 Nigerians were slaughtered as the intensification of the bloody war being waged relentlessly by daredevil armed non-state actors in Nigeria. There is no doubt that the heads of the Nigeria Security Agencies have continued to provide leadership and statesmanship that will enable security forces defeat and dislodge these gangsters threatening the National Security of Nigeria. Now that Present Tinubu has axed the former Service Chiefs and replaced them with new ones, it is expected that the strategies and tactics to combat insecurity will change. It will no longer be business as usual as the new sheriffs in town are expected to deploy their experiences and dexterity to make a huge difference as they will learn from the pitfalls of the former chiefs and deliver the nation from insecurity. This is the major expectations of Nigerians across every divide. This takes the cover of our November Edition with a caption; New Sheriffs take over as Nigerians demand an end to insurgency and banditry.
